Summer Seminar Memories by Rod Frechette

The excitement continued to build heading north on I-25 with our illustrious champion of the 4th estate, Phil V., piloting his car the next 5 + hours toward Colorado Springs. Two years of COVID shut downs, how would things go? **Excellent** from the get go. Old friends to reacquaint with and new ones to make. This was as fun as starting your favorite new school year and going on vacation. Dorm rooms assigned and photo IDs made. Golf cart shuttles around. Friendly staff assisting and many of the Gods & Goddesses of Numismatics approachable and sharing. The comradery and late-night bull sessions. Bill DeWeese is our new Life Member. He joins a very small select group of people recognized for above and beyond service to the Albuquerque Coin Club. This is a fitting honor for our super volunteer – a man who's always ready to help out the club in any endeavor year after year.

Bill was born and raised in Troy, OH. He earned a degree in accounting and economics from Hastings College, Nebraska. He has worked over the years in a number of finance positions.

Our club superstar started his numismatic



journey at the age of nine when his parents bought him a coin collector starter kit. They continued to encourage his interest by giving him a new Red Book every year. His interest expanded with a paper route that brought new coins to go through every week and a few extra bucks to buy a coin now and then. Although his collecting hit a lull during high school and college (study, girls and other distractions), he slowly returned to the hobby with time. His move to Albuquerque in 1987 for a new accounting position opened new collecting vistas with coin shops and an active collecting community. Bill joined the ANA in 2000, and the Albuquerque Coin Club two years later. He has been an active member ever since serving as a club officer (President and Treasurer) or board member for at least fifteen of those twenty-one years.

Bill collects an eclectic mix of numismatic items. His focus in recent years has been putting together a complete set of Lincoln cents in MS-63 Red/Brown or better; he is down to a handful of early cents to complete the set. Bill also collects Civil War era numismatic items (tokens, stamp money, coins, etc.), fractional currency, and coinage from the Netherlands, his family's ancestral home.

In addition to his numismatic interests, Bill has been a member of the Kiwanis for 32 years; he has served them as the President and a board member for six years. Bill isn't planning to retire for another six years or so. His retirement goal is to work part time for one of the local coin dealers.

January Presentation

Our January meeting saw Rod Frechette giving us a tutorial on coin making methods through time. Early coining was accomplished by Casting and Striking. Mining, smelting and refining ore was conducted thousands of years before coins arrived on the scene in the 7th century BC. People first found metals near water and on the ground; mining developed over time.

Early mining produced supplies of lead, copper, tin, silver, gold and electrum (a naturally occurring mixture of silver and gold). When copper was alloyed with tin it produced bronze, a much harder material than either of its components. Bronze was critically important for

tools in the time before iron was able to be worked.


People practiced casting for many years using the lost wax, sand cast and other mold methods. More interesting was the process for striking metals. Metal ingots

- were pounded (to be replaced by rolling) into sheets.
- "Planchettes" were cut or punched from the sheets.

Dies were cut into the striking surface of the striking

die, and a design was carved into the anvil element whether wood or metal. Final-

- ly, the planchette was placed between the top and bottom dies and struck with a
- hammer to impart the design.

First of all, a hardy congratulations goes out to Bill DeWeese for his well-deserved nomination and election by the general membership to the elite rank of Life Member. Bill has been


