ACC Invades Summer Seminar

Seven yellow vested students attended the first week of Summer Seminar in Colorado Springs, CO. Another three attended the second week. More than any other club, ACC supports Summer Seminar for the courses, the comradery, and the value.

415 students from around the country (and a few from overseas) attended the 30+ courses offered. Every course was led by





r instructors who are experts in their fields. Each course provides an immersion into the subject area for 4 days. Every student comes away with an expanded knowledge set to use back home.

The academic experience is possible because of the organization and hard work of the ANA Staff in coordination with the Colorado College. In addition to identifying courses and instructors, developing a course catalogue, judging scholarship applications and processing student

paperwork, they are there throughout the sessions to facilitate the experience. They also look forward to enabling future Summer Seminars with YN auctions (\$34,000 raised) to fund YN scholarships, a book sale (\$11,000 raised) to support the library, and an end of session banquet to recognize accomplishments. Staff members also shuttle students around the campus and to/from the airport. They also resolve problems that arise and deal with emergencies.


There's no doubt that Christian loves her job. She looks forward to working to improve the ANA's education experience for years to come. I look forward to working with her for years to come as well.

"Coin" Notes

Our June meeting saw Morgan Bleth educating the membership on 1890-91 Treasury Notes. The government issued the Treasury Note under the authority of the Sherman Silver Purchase Act. They were issued to individuals selling silver bullion to the treasury and were redeemable in silver or gold coin (hence the nickname "coin notes"). Manipulation of the



monetary markets led to the withdrawal of Treasury Notes in 1893.



Treasury notes were the large size of the day (7.375 by 3.125 inches). The most famous of these is the 1890 \$1,000 note nick-named "The Grand Watermelon" due to the shape and coloring of the zeros on the reverse. These notes are very rare; a recent auction garnered over \$3 million for one.



The financials for the month of June were pretty simple and straight forward. We had \$993.00 in revenues and \$237.22 is expenditures. The key takeaway was the \$500.00 rent we charged the Expo New Mexico for the rent of 50 display cases for use during the upcoming state fair. The net result was a profit for the month of \$755.78 and a reduction of the year-to-date loss to \$2,444.93.

Our checking account is still looking respectable with a reconciled balance of \$17,829.69 and we still have over \$30,700 in CD's.

A reminder to everyone that the plastic club bucks that we are currently using will be demonetized as of November 30, 2023. So spend whatever er you have before then.
